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


RUTH CHAPTER 4 Boaz Redeems Ruth

"Praise be to the LORD, who this day has not left you without a kinsman-redeemer." (4:14)

A. THE REDEMPTION OF THE LAND (4:1-17)

- 1. Boaz wants to marry Ruth but there is a closer relative.
- 2. The closer relative rejects the offer of the land and marriage to Ruth.
- 3. Boaz then "buys" the property and the deal was sealed by taking off his sandal and giving it to the closer relative.
- 4. The deal included Ruth whom he married.
- 5. Ruth and Boaz eventually have a son, who was named Obed.
- 6. Obed became the father of Jesse, the father of King David (1 Sam. 16:1).



B. THE GENEALOGY OF DAVID (4:18-21)

- 1. Ruth, becomes the great-grandmother of King David (See Matthew 1:1-17).
- 2. By bringing in a non-Israelite into the covenant, God is fulfilling his promise to Abraham that all nations will be blessed through his seed (Gen. 12:3).
- 3. The Book of Ruth opens with three funerals but closes with a wedding and a birth.
- 4. There is a good deal of weeping recorded in the first chapter, but the last chapter records an overflowing of joy in the little town of Bethlehem.






Figure 1: The Genealogy of David
