




ROMANS

A Snapshot of the Book of Romans

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I. THE GOSPEL EXPLAINED (ROMANS 1–8)

Justification

The believer is freed from the **penalty of sin**. Justification explains how sinners are made right with God. Paul teaches that no one can be justified by obeying the law, but only through faith in Jesus Christ. God declares believers righteous because of Christ's finished work on the cross, not because of human effort (Romans 3:21–24; 5:1).

Sanctification

The believer is being freed from the **power of sin**. Sanctification describes the ongoing process of spiritual growth after salvation. Believers are brought from the power of sin and enabled by the Holy Spirit to live new lives that please God. This is a daily, lifelong transformation as we learn to walk by the Spirit instead of the flesh (Romans 6:6–14; 8:1–11).

Glorification

The believer will be freed from the **presence of sin**. Glorification points to the future completion of salvation. One day, believers will be fully delivered from sin's presence and share in Christ's glory. Our future hope is secure because God has already planned and guaranteed it (Romans 8:17–18, 29–30).

II. THE GOSPEL AND ISRAEL (ROMANS 9–11)

Israel's Past — Selected

God chose Israel by grace, shaped them by covenant, and used them to bring salvation to the world (Romans 9:6–29).

Israel's Present — Rejected

In Paul's present day, Israel as a nation largely rejected the gospel, yet God preserved a faithful remnant who believed. Israel's rejection opened the door for the gospel to spread widely among the Gentiles (Romans 11:1–6, 11).

Israel's Future — Accepted

Paul reveals that Israel's rejection is **not final**. In God's future plan, Israel will experience a national turning to Christ. This shows God's faithfulness to His promises and His mercy toward all people (Romans 11:25–27, 32).

III. HOW TO LIVE THE GOSPEL (ROMANS 12–15)

Express God's Love

Living the gospel begins with **genuine love**. Believers are called to love others sincerely, serve humbly, and reflect Christ's compassion in everyday relationships (Romans 12:9–13; 13:8–10).

Live a Godly Life

The gospel transforms how we live. Christians are urged to offer their lives fully to God, resist conformity to the world, and pursue moral and spiritual renewal through God's truth (Romans 12:1–2; 13:12–14).

Stay in Community

The gospel creates a **unified community** of believers. Paul urges Christians to accept one another, avoid unnecessary disputes, and build each other up in love—especially when differences of conscience arise (Romans 14:1, 19; 15:5–7).

SUMMARY

The book of Romans presents a clear and powerful picture of the gospel—from God's saving work in Christ to its transforming impact on everyday life. Paul explains how sinners are **justified by faith, sanctified by the Spirit, and ultimately glorified by God's promise**, all according to His grace. Paul also reveals God's faithfulness to Israel, showing that human unbelief cannot cancel divine purpose. Finally, Romans calls believers to live out the gospel through **love, godliness, and fellowship**, demonstrating that the gospel is not only something we believe but something that shapes how we live for God and with one another.
