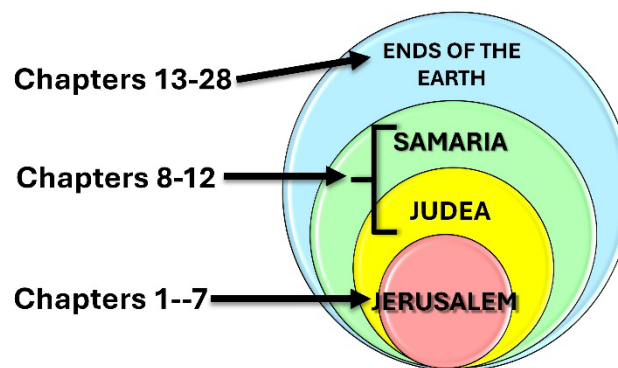
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MAIN IDEA

ACTS IS WRITTEN IN THREE MAIN PARTS

Acts 1:8 “But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in **Jerusalem**, and in all **Judea and Samaria**, and to the **ends of the earth**.”
